2.2 General Announcements Presenter: Rudy Besikof	 President Besikof provided an update. January 27, 2022 Action Letter from ACCJC President Besikof provided update regarding the action letter we received from ACCJC. The college were notified by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges that our status has been modified from probation to warning. And we remain fully accredited. It was also added by Preisdent Besikof that this is an improvement in our status. We have six or twelve months to provide a fellow report. Our fellow up report is due in eight months. A special appreciation to Rupinder Bhatia, Karen Tellegen and Chris Wiedenbach and to all individuals that were involved. A word of appreciation to everyone who participated through this process. It was also added by President Besikof that one of the actionable items where we needed to improve as a district. It had to do with enrollment management, setting FTS targets, the Commission ruled that we are now in 	

	compliance as it relates to that. And that is	
	really the piece of other sanctions that are all	
	the items that were cited as recommendations. It	
	was shared by President Besikof that the fact	
	that our strategic enrollment management	
	committee is putting together a plan that it's	
	now revisiting and reworking this was	
	something we did and felt that the college is	
	ahead on this.	
0	Union Bank opened Monday 2/7, Grand Opening	
	Event in April	
	Professor Kim Glosson provided an update on	
	this item.	
	It was shared that the Union Bank opened on	
	Monday, February 7, 2022.	
	They had their first customer as well as their

	had been awarded a \$46,000 plus grant from the
	Alameda County Food Bank to continue our

	basic needs. In addition to that, we also now
	have been given a distribution along with other
	colleges in the state. Per assembly Bill 132
	which addresses student basic needs in the
	amount of \$235,062.00.

	meet the basic needs the Office of the Vice
	President of students services is hoping to

	connecting with other departments/individuals
