
UMOJA PRACTICE

RAISING INTENTIONAL & DELIBERATE

HBCU SPOTLIGHT

Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) are institutions of higher learning in the U.S. that were established before 1964 with the primary mission of educating Black Americans. Many were founded during the Reconstruction era, following the Civil War, when most colleges and universities excluded Black students.

Cheyney University of Pennsylvania was the first HBCU, established in 1837. Now, with 10 major courses of study and 6 minors, Cheyney University, home of the wolves, has graduated over 30,000 students. With the motto, Today's Leaders, Tomorrow's Leaders, Cheyney University of Pennsylvania has lead the charge to education black students!
