Nazario reviews her background as the child of immigrants, her inspiration for writing this story, and the process that she begins as she prepares to research and write Enrique's story. The writer tells how and where she finds Enrique and how he is representative of the children whose story she desires to tell.

Readers see Enrique's rebellion against the relatives with whom he lives in Honduras and Enrique's desire to make his own journey to follow his mother.

The chapter ends as Maria Isabel, four years after Enrique left Honduras, leaves herself to try to find a better life for her child.
