PRE-REQUISITE

Successful completion of English 201AB, a C grade or better, is necessary, or assessment or counselor placement.

PURPOSE/LEARNING OUTCOMES

The purpose of English 1A is, by examining articles, stories, essays, and longer works, to become a better critical thinking and writer. We will work on identifying main and subordinate ideas, defining audience and purpose in our own and others' writing, and organizing ideas. Individual perspectives in essays are crucial here, as well as command of standard grammar. You will learn to appropriately cite information from sources to evaluate their relevancy and reliability, and incorporate them effectively into your own work. You will also learn to locate information from print and electronic sources—from libraries, the Internet, databases, and elsewhere, in order to evaluate relevancy and reliability, and incorporate it effectively into your writing.

All this will apply to your other school work and, ultimately, communicating with others in your professional lives, as well as, I hope, make you a better listener, reader, and a more active participant in society.

^{*}You must get a C+ average on essays to pass this class, but you can fail the class if you don't complete the other work too, such as reading responses and in class activities.

READING & WRITING ASSIGNMENTS

- All reading responses and essays written outside of class and submitted for a grade must be typed, titled, pages numbered, and on 8 1/2" x 11" paper. They are due at the beginning of class or when the teacher asks for them.
- Bring the original draft of your essay plus two copies to all in-class peer-review workshops. You are advised to keep a copy of every essay you turn in.
- Email all your written work to yourself, both in the body of the email and as an attachment, even if you keep it on a thumb drive or other device, so you can always print it out. Arrive early enough at school to print work out before class.
- No late work is accepted, period. If you arrive late and hand your work to me, I will not accept it. However, I may at times have to make decisions on a case-by-case basis depending on the circumstances.
- Not turning in Reading Responses will significantly lower your grade or cause you to fail.

ESSAYS & READING RESPONSES

- 1. **Essays:** For each assignment, the format: Typed, double spaced, 12 point font, with 1 inch margins and page numbers, MLA format (check your "style guide"—see required books)
- 2. **Peer response**: Other students in the class will give you feedback on your essay rough drafts for each assignment. On peer review days, bring your TYPED rough draft (2 copies), which must be a "good faith" effort of at least 2-3 full pages.
- 3. **Attendance at each peer review workshop,** with a draft, is mandatory to receive full credit for your essay. Absences from peer response will result in a full grade reduction for that paper.
- 4. **You must submit** your rough draft, along with your peer response sheet and final copy, in order to receive full credit for an essay.
- 5. **Reading Responses**: Both for the <u>Blair Reader</u> and for <u>Enrique's Journey</u>. These must be typed, double spaced, 12 point font, 1-3 pages.

READING QUIZZES & QUIZZES

- **1. Reading Quizzes:** These will take place the first ten minutes of class for all readings in the <u>Blair Reader</u>. You will identity and state the readings' main idea or position on an issue, and describe some of the important face, examples, reasoning, or stories that elaborate the point or support the position.
- **2. Quizzes:** For Enrique's Journey, there will be three graded quizzes, one each covering several chapters, short answer questions based on information covered in the chapters to make sure you have done the reading.

ATTENDANCE

- You must be on time and stay the length of the class to be given credit for attending. 2 Tardies = 1 absence. Attendance is mandatory. If you miss more than 5 classes, you will receive an F in the course. (Note: I do not distinguish between "excused" and "unexcused" absences; if you miss more than 5 classes, for any reason, you cannot pass the class.)
- Please let me know if you have an emergency, or if you do have to leave early for whatever reason or cannot make it to class: let me know even if your absence will not be excused.
- If you are absent, it is your responsibility to find out about the work you missed and make it up.

Please get the names and contact information of classmates to find out what you have missed during an absence.

- Get the texts ASAP and make copies of some readings from library reserve desk if necessary
- Look at the reading schedule every day

ACADEMIC HONESTY

Intentionally OR unintentionally stealing work from other classmates, internet or other sources is not only illegal, but it makes you look bad. This can simply mean not putting a page or web address number after you quote from a source, or can mean not using quotation marks. I will review how to attribute where you got a source, but in the end, it is your responsibility. Students will receive an "F" grade on plagiarized work.
